# DID YOU KNOW?

- More than 72,000 of our neighbors in Douglas County are food insecure, meaning they lack access, at times, to enough food for an active, healthy life for all household members.
- 42 percent of our neighbors who live below the poverty line worry that their food may run out before they can afford to purchase more.
- Food insecurity during a child's early years threatens brain development, and it has been linked to nutrient deficiencies that lead to learning and development problems.
- In the United States, it's estimated that between 30-40 percent of the food supply is wasted.

# reflections



Together, we did it! In 2019, we hit a milestone of over 1 million pounds of healthy excess food rescued and shared with our nonprofit partner agencies to feed their clients. This brought the total amount of food rescued since operations began in October 2013 to just over 4 million pounds. This translates to more than 2,000 tons of perfectly good food that has been kept out of our landfills.

It's exciting to think back on how far we have come in six short years and the impact it's made on our community, thanks to the support of our financial donors, food donors, nonprofit partner agencies and other followers. Nutritious foods that otherwise would have been wasted have graced the tables of some of our most challenged neighbors, providing several million healthy meals. This quality food provides nutrition for kids to learn and grow and for the elderly and our veterans to lead healthier lives.

Saving Grace started with one refrigerated truck and driver who picked up donated food from three locations. In 2019, we operated a fleet of four refrigerated trucks, and our five drivers/food ambassadors picked up from 58 food vendors and delivered the donated food to 43 nonprofit partner agencies.

We believe it just makes sense to feed hungry bellies, rather than landfills, with excess healthy foods, and that's what we continue to do. Thank you for believing in this mission and helping us expand to meet the growing demand for our distribution and logistics services.

Let's continue in 2020 to change the way our community thinks about surplus, wasted food. Together, we can ensure more nutritious perishable foods end up on dinner tables than in our landfills. Together, we can help keep bodies and our environment healthy and happy.

### SAVING GRACE IS MAKING AN IMPACT. ONE POUND OF FOOD AT A TIME

Connecting healthy, excess perishable food that would otherwise add to landfill waste with organizations that feed the hungry just makes sense, and that's what Saving Grace does. Here's how:

- Each weekday morning, our drivers use refrigerated trucks to pick up surplus produce, meats, dairy products, packaged and prepared meals, and other nutritious foods from a network of food donors.
- This food is delivered the same day free of charge to nonprofit partner agencies that feed the hungry, including food pantries, transitional living facilities, shelters, children's afterschool programs, senior citizen centers and health clinics.
- Outreach efforts and events build awareness in the community about wasted food and hunger, which leads to a decrease in the amount of food thrown out. As they become more educated about the issues, more businesses donate their surplus foods, and community members learn ways they can reduce food waste in their own lives.

## We Appreciate Our Food Donors

Feeding our hungry neighbors with surplus food that is still good just makes sense, and that's what our food donor partners help us do. Their donations of healthy fruits and vegetables, dairy products, meats, prepared and packaged meals, bakery products and more make Saving Grace's work possible. This also makes good business sense, as donors receive a tax credit, save on dumpster fees and support their sustainability plans.




